Dear Lenten Sojourners,

The observation of Easter changes every year. The date is determined as the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox. The dating of Easter also has biblical roots in the Old Testament Passover. In 325 AD, the Council of Nicaea (the same council from which we have the origins of the Nicene Creed) established the current method of calculating the date of Easter. Easter can fall on any Sunday between March 22nd and April 25th.



This year, Easter is on April 20th. Holy Week begins April 13th with Palm/Passion Sunday. Once again, this year, in solemn devotion and preparation, Concordia will have church services every evening of Holy Week at 7:00pm. The preparations of Lent, the restraint of joy, the special focus on the Passion of Christ for us, and our exerted efforts for inner purification and sanctification, self-denial and prayer all culminate in the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus. Just like the Divine Service, the Church's yearly season of Lent giving way to the bursting of joy on Easter is a rehearsal for the Last Day.

The 40 days of Lent are a small-scale version of our whole Christian life. The special practices of Lent are not limited to those 40 days. Sanctification and purification, special exertion of self-denial to not sin, and increased efforts in prayer, reading and hearing God's Word, and attending the Divine Service should always be our focus. As St. Paul describes our life as a race, daily we run and prepare for the joy of the final Easter when Christ returns and raises all the dead! Every Sunday the Church meets together to be refreshed and to rehearse for eternal life. Receiving the Bread of Life, Absolution, God's Word, and Christ's Body and blood, enlighten, enliven, and prepare us for this "lent" we experience each day in the season of our earthly life.

As the Day of resurrection draws near, Jesus says life will become even more difficult. There will be constant and unmistakable signs that the end is near (including false Christs and apostasy!). For those who reject Jesus and the Gospel, these signs are reminders that He is standing at the gate and will judge and condemn them. But believers in Christ may be encouraged when reminded that Jesus is coming soon, for we know this means salvation is drawing near!

We have church services at Concordia each night of Holy Week (and more on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday) so that we do not face the darkness and dread of our sin alone. We hear and prepare with Jesus, the Lamb of God, who bears our sin to the darkness and forsakenness of the cross. At His end it looked like all hope was lost. It

seemed the devil and evil and wickedness won. Because of this, many are deceived to live, not by faith in what they hear from Jesus, but by the evil and crosses they see. We who live by faith and not by sight know Good Friday is not the end, just as Jesus' signs of the end of the age are not the end. The End is what Jesus promises, "...and after three days [the Son of Man] will rise from the dead" (Mark 10:43), and "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in Me, though he die, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in Me shall never die" (John 11:25-26).

Be with us through this season, Lord, And all our earthly days, That when the final Easter dawns, We join in heaven's praise. LSB 418 v.4

The joy of Easter is astounding, earth shattering, and life changing! Jesus is risen, and we shall arise! Christ is the Son of God, His doctrine is the truth, God the Father has accepted Christ's sacrifice for the reconciliation of the world! And after the season of "lent" of this corrupted world all believers in Christ will rise to eternal life. Jesus said, "Because I live, you also will live" (John 14:19).

Pew Ponderings

From the Pew: Have you ever tried to get a blood stain out of a white garment? Unless you use cold water first or use a laundry enzyme or whitener spray, it's almost impossible. Now ponder this. In the book of Revelation it speaks of a great multitude of people standing before the throne of God wearing white robes. An elder asks, "Who are these people in the white robes"? St John, the author of Revelation, answers, "These are they who have come out of the great tribulation, they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb". What? How can that be? A garment made white by washing it in blood? Yes! It's those white robes of righteousness that Jesus clothes us in: washed white when He shed His blood on the cross. No cold water, no spray or enzyme – His blood! Thanks be to God! We now wear a white robe of righteousness made white in the blood of the Lamb.

From the Pastor: In the Old Testament book of Zechariah, chapter 3, the High Priest Joshua experienced such a cleansing, foreshadowing this holy washing in the blood of Christ. In Zechariah's vision, Joshua is wearing filthy garments. This is not proper for the High Priest, yet it cannot be helped! He is standing before the angel of the Lord. Satan is there too, doing what he does best: accusing Joshua for his filthy garments. But the Lord would not permit Satan to speak, saying, "The Lord rebuke you, O Satan! The Lord who has chosen Jerusalem rebuke you!..." The rest of the vision is a beautiful picture of the cleansing from sin and the dressing in righteousness our Lord grants us: "And the angel said to those who were standing before [Joshua], "Remove the filthy garments from him." And to him he said, "Behold, I have taken your iniquity away from you, and I will clothe you with pure vestments." And I [Zechariah] said, "Let them put a clean turban on his head." So they put a clean turban on his head and clothed him with garments. And the angel of the Lord was standing by." Thanks be to God for this eternal cleansing He grant to us! "In Christ Jesus you are all sons of God, through faith. For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ." (Galatians 3:26-27)



The Geneseo-Atkinson Food Pantry is open: Mondays 9:00-7:00, Tuesdays and Thursdays 9:00-4:00, and Fridays 9:00-12:00. Food is distributed, and donations are gratefully accepted during business hours. We also have collection boxes in the vestibule at Fareway, NOSH, and Inspire Continuing Care for donations. The Clothing room is closed on Fridays. The Food Pantry will be **closed on April 18** in observance of Good Friday.

Because of the community's generous support, the Food Pantry provided food assistance to **356** households in January. Thanks to the many donors who make this possible! The Food Pantry rescues food from Aldi, Dollar Fresh, Dollar General, Fareway, Jewel, McDonald's, NOSH, Pizza Hut, and Walmart (Geneseo and Silvis). We are grateful for our partnerships with these businesses! We also receive food from River Bend and Midwest Food Banks. Since we are able to purchase food at a low cost from River Bend Food Bank, your monetary donations can go farther than if you purchased food from a store to donate. We are grateful



for any and all types of donations! Guests at the Geneseo-Atkinson Food Pantry are able to choose the food they take home, so food is not wasted and guests get the food they need.

The Geneseo-Atkinson Food Pantry now has a van, a gift from the congregation at Grace United Methodist Church in Geneseo. Now that the Food Pantry picks up food from three stores outside of Geneseo, it was not feasible for the Pantry employees' vehicles to be utilized due to traveling distance and quantity of food. Donations often require multiple trips due to the size of personal vehicles. The donation of the van will enable the Food Pantry to pick up larger quantities of food in less trips, which will help meet the increased need. Thank you, Grace United Methodist Church!

Do you want to achieve significant life changes and receive help and support setting and reaching your goals? Then the **Five Loaves** program at Geneseo-Atkinson Food Pantry is for you! Call 309-944-3165 or visit geneseofoodpantry.org for more information.

Dietitians from Hammond-Henry Hospital taught a **free healthy cooking class** on February 20 in the Matthew 25 room at the Food Pantry. Guests were provided with recipes for lower cost healthy dishes, a cooking demonstration, and free samples of healthy food. The Dietitians will be back to teach a class on **March 11 at 1:00**, and it's open to the public.

The Food Pantry partners with local nurses to provide two **Foot Care Clinics** to the public each month. Nurses soak feet, trim and file toenails, help with ingrown toenails, and give a light foot massage with lotion. Please call 309-944-3165 or email geneseopantry1@gmail.com to make an appointment. Cost is \$37 but Food Pantry guests are given a voucher.

The Food Pantry accepts any size clothing, accessories, kitchenware, decorations, books, games, toys, movies, and other household items. If donors have large items they want to donate, we post the name of the item on the white board, and if someone is interested in the item, we give them the phone number of the donor to arrange pickup.



Our Volunteer of the Month, **Teresa Krause**, has been volunteering at the Food Pantry since August. She works in the clothing room greeting customers, sorting donations, and helping guests find clothing. Teresa is married to Steve, and they have six children and 17 grandchildren. She enjoys reading, gardening, cooking, and traveling. She is also active in various ministries at First Methodist Church. Teresa said the best thing about volunteering at the Food Pantry is helping people. When she retired, she wanted to give back to her community by helping people in need. Teresa said that one morning she helped a man who was starting from nothing find some housewares for his apartment. He was so grateful, and it warmed her heart. Thank you, Teresa!
